CONFERENCE THEME: DRAMA AND THE WORLD

This year marks **100 years since the birth of Dorothy Heathcote**. There have already been many attempts to describe what made her so remarkable. Gavin Bolton called her:

an artist in the classroom, and I think she's ahead of her time, and I think it's going to take many generations of teachers before the profession really understands what she is saying, and the work that she is doing.

Akiko Kato said:

She's so big. Her mind is big. Her heart is big, and her idea is big; and she thinks children big. She believes in children, and she believes children have great ability and possibility.

And Bernadette Mosala said:

I wish it were possible to have pieces of Dorothy, scattered all over, to add as yeast. Dorothy's work should be the fulcrum of education internationally.

In many ways, **this is exactly what has happened**. Pieces of Dorothy have been scattered all over the world. Ideas, questions, ways of seeing, ways of working—and, perhaps most importantly, ways of **thinking about teachers and children**—have travelled far beyond the places where Dorothy herself worked. They have been taken up, adapted, questioned, translated and reimagined by teachers and drama practitioners across the world.

That international legacy is something we will be exploring and celebrating at a special **Dorothy Heathcote Now** conference in November, where we will be looking at the impact and continuing development of Dorothy's work around the world. We will hear from delegates and presenters from **Brazil, Iraq, Palestine, India, the USA, China, Turkey, New Zealand, Australia, Ireland and across Europe**.

Happy 100th birthday, Dorothy. Your pieces are indeed scattered all over the world. And the work is still growing.

DAY ONE: SATURDAY 7TH NOVEMBER

9am–10am: KEYNOTE

BRIAN EDMISTON: DOROTHY HEATHCOTE'S VISIONARY APPROACH TO EDUCATION

On the centenary of her birth, it seems fitting to highlight the four complementary approaches or 'models' to using drama in education that Dorothy developed over her professional life: drama to explore people; Mantle of the Expert; Rolling Role; and the Commission Model. In this interactive presentation I will illustrate how she envisions a transformative purpose of education, by showing how, in her words, these 'four models can forge links between schooling and society'. Her early work in which she demonstrated the power of drama as an art form in exploring facets of life is now often referred to as Process Drama. With the Mantle of the Expert approach, students can learn to collaborate with grown-up responsibilities in relation to increasingly complex societal concerns. Her Rolling Role approach was intended to use fictional contexts to create shared social concerns for a whole school community. Her Commission Model placed education firmly in service of the social and cultural needs of others in communities beyond the classroom. I hope to show how in our increasingly divisive troubling times, Dorothy can guide us toward a more transformative unifying vision of education in society.

10.15am – 12.15pm: EXPLORATORY WORKING GROUPS: SESSION ONE

WORKING GROUP A. MAGGIE HULSON & SORREL OATES - AT HOME IN THE WORLD

As we step into a story, we move away from the clock time of our world, onto a platform from where the views are different. From where we might see what there is to be learnt from, and for, our world.

Continuing our collaboration between teachers in Palestine and England, our practical drama workshops will explore the relationship between story and the creation of significant moments, between pedagogy and the world outside the drama room. With Sorrel Oates and Maggie Hulson in the room, and Ghuson Orouq (Jenin) and Raja Farah (Ramallah) joining us online on the Saturday, these four members of NATD (National Association for the Teaching of Drama) will raise questions concerning imagination and the choice of story, and inquire into the insights afforded by an understanding of metaxis and the projection and protections of role.

WORKING GROUP B. TIM TAYLOR & RICHARD KIERAN - BETWEEN WORLDS

Exploring Dorothy Heathcote's Twilight Role

This practical workshop explores Dorothy Heathcote's concept of twilight role: a subtle way of working that allows the teacher to facilitate, guide and inform from within the fictional world. Rather than standing outside the work and asking students to "show me," the teacher joins them in a shared process of inquiry: "Let's see." Through practical activities and examples from classroom practice, participants will explore how small shifts in language, tone and positioning can sustain the fiction, guide curriculum learning and create greater opportunities for student contribution and responsibility. They will leave with ideas and techniques they can adapt and use in their own settings.

WORKING GROUP C. IONA TOWLER EVANS & LISA HINTON - DOROTHY HEATHCOTE'S CONCEPT OF "THE OTHER"

Give children something so attractive in the room that they feel they are staring at it rather than being stared at themselves.

How can we create learning spaces where children feel safe enough to take risks, think deeply and explore challenging ideas? In this interactive workshop, Dr Iona Towler Evans and Lisa Hinton explore Heathcote's concept of *the Other* and its enduring significance for contemporary practice. Using compelling classroom examples, participants will investigate how distance, role and imagined contexts attract learners, deepen meaning and foster agency.

Why attend?

- Explore a key Heathcote concept.
- See authentic examples from contemporary classroom practice.
- Gain practical strategies for creating safe, engaging learning environments.
- Reflect on how agency emerges through carefully designed tasks.

WORKING GROUP D. PAM BOWELL - THINKING ON YOUR FEET

Negotiating and facilitating the co-creativity between participants and teacher in process drama

Dorothy Heathcote saw the planning process as critical in creating compelling and successful drama learning experiences – as any of us fortunate enough to have studied with her will attest. She was meticulous in her preparations before ever she got to her teaching space. However, she was also rigorous in planning as a drama unfolded in action. She was consummate in her ability to 'think on one's feet' and meld her teaching objectives with the contributions of the participants through a process of co-creativity.

This practical workshop will use an upper Key Stage 2 process drama as the means to examine the 'in action' decision-making process and its consequences for the drama and the learning. The drama draws on one incident in a traditional legend from Southeast Asia as the basis to explore the qualities of leadership. We will consider the four 'heads' that both teacher and participants (playwright, actor, director and teacher/learner) bring to a drama and how this process of co-creativity impacts on the teacher's choices of drama strategies and signs as the drama unfolds in real time.

A. THEO BRYER, REBECCA WILSON & NICK KITCHENER-BENTLEY: MAKING CONNECTIONS

Learning through collaboration in local and international contexts

Theo Bryer, Rebecca Wilson and Nick Kitchener-Bentley will share their experiences of collaboration, research and learning together for over a decade at UCL's Institute of Education, in schools, Higher Education and internationally. They will do this through the form of two short presentations and an installation.

Theo and Rebecca's interactive installation draws on their experiences of doing drama and filmmaking in India and Nepal and is designed to engage, raise questions and provoke discussion about how we can work across borders and learn from each other, meaningfully and ethically.

B. FLÁVIA JANIASKI & TEAM: PROCESS DRAMA - PERSPECTIVES FROM BRAZIL

This presentation shares the experience of a research project that brings together drama, education and environmental issues in Brazilian state schools in Mato Grosso do Sul. Drawing on a Process Drama 'The Mythological Jaguar', developed with teachers and children, we will discuss how the approach was reimagined in dialogue with local territories, biomes and Brazilian cultures, particularly the Cerrado. The experience also highlights learning around teacher autonomy, collaboration and transdisciplinarity, contributing to reflections on how drama transforms as it moves across different cultural and educational contexts. C. VOICES OF THE GOVERNORS: WOODROW FIRST SCHOOL

This session offers a rare, inside perspective on what it means for a school to operate as a fully committed Mantle of the Expert institution. Five governors will discuss how Woodrow has embedded Mantle across its curriculum, the obstacles encountered along the way, and the strategies that have enabled teachers to become confident, creative practitioners of the approach. Two governors who have had children at the school will speak from first-hand experience about its impact on learners, while the panel as a whole will draw on wider Mantle research to explore the benefits for engagement, agency, and attainment. The session will also showcase examples of Mantle in action at Woodrow, including video material illustrating how children take on expert roles to drive their learning.

A. CECILY O'NEILL: BREAKING NEWS

Participants create news headlines from any moment in history or an imagined future of the world. They choose one headline to explore further.

B. PAUL SUTTON (Artistic Director, C&T): PUSH-PULL

Story Systems, Process Drama and Global Participation

This workshop explores the theoretical foundations and implementation of Push-Pull, a C&T project involving young migrants in Worcester and participants in New York City and Korogocho, Kenya. It asks how drama and digital technology might combine to enable individuals and communities whose voices are often marginalised to create interactive narratives, exchange perspectives and share their stories with global audiences. Using C&T's Story Systems methodology, the session will examine how principles drawn from Dorothy Heathcote's practice can inform the design of participatory digital experiences. Push-Pull employs process drama strategies including role, frame, task, sign, productive tension and the

careful distribution of responsibility between facilitator and participant. Role and working in role provide an underpinning metaphor and practical structure through which participants encounter stories of migration, contribute material from their own locations and respond to contributions created elsewhere. Participants in the workshop will experience practical examples of tasks being undertaken in classrooms and community settings. They will also explore the architecture of the digital interface through which children and young people can participate remotely, including in locations where a C&T facilitator is not present.

C. ALISON REEVES: "TWO ISLANDS"

Exploring the Impact of Teacher in Role

This session will use the story of *Two Islands* by Ivan Gantschev as a framework for exploring the impact of Teacher-in Role. I have taught Dorothy Heathcote's techniques on my Theatre and Education module at The University of Worcester for several years now and have used a version of this session to encourage my Theatre, Acting and Performance students to interact with Education Studies students. It has proved to be a good way of them getting to know each other in a practical and unthreatening way. It also promotes an understanding of the way a teacher can take on an Authoritarian and Victim role to deepen involvement in the Drama for all participants.

D. REBECCA PATTERSON & ALISON RAMSAY: "THE KING WHO WANTED TO TOUCH THE MOON"

The workshop uses fable and allegory to explore power, leadership, and political hubris through drama. It demonstrates how aesthetic-affective approaches can help learners engage thoughtfully with contemporary social and political issues. In the spirit of Dorothy Heathcote's vision of educating "citizens of the world," participants will experience how stories from across cultures can foster empathy, critical reflection, and ethical understanding.

STIG A. ERIKSSON: DISTANCING IN DRAMA

The notion of 'distancing' has a long and complex history in the arts. The keynote will examine distancing "at close range" from the perspective of drama and theatre practice, considering it both as a poetic device and as a pedagogical device.

A. DAVID ALLEN & ROBERTA LUCHINI: "LIVING HISTORY"

Our presentation will introduce the recent *Dorothy Heathcote Living History* project, and will showcase innovative work with young people in role in museum settings such as the Black Country Living Museum and the Old Operating Theatre. We will explore how immersive role-play can deepen historical understanding, and support students in researching past periods, embodying historical perspectives, and designing their own "living history" museum experiences.

B. VAISHALI CHAKRAVARTY & VISHAKHA CHAKRAVARTY: PROCESS TO PRODUCT

Mantle of the Expert's journey from classroom to the stage.

C. BOB SELDERSLAGHS: "PART OF ME"

Where identity, creative ageing and conventions of dramatic action meet

Part of Me is a creative ageing approach developed within a residential care home in Antwerp, inspired by Dorothy Heathcote's *Mantle of the Expert* and conventions of dramatic action. Moving beyond dominant ageist narratives that reduce residents to a single identity of dependency, the practice invites older adults to (re-)engage with meaningful roles—from their past or present—through one-to-one dramatic inquiry. Using embodied, sensory, and narrative techniques, participants represent and explore a personal role and different points of view, often uncovering new perspectives on their own (hi)stories.

WORKSHOP A. CECILY O'NEILL: AFTERMATH – THE SURVIVORS

We will explore the different dramatic possibilities offered by events whose repercussions may be personal, local or global.

WORKSHOP B. STIG A. ERIKSSON: "ISN'T IT JUST A FAIRY TALE?"

This process drama workshop will use a folk tale with international variants as a frame story for exploring cross-cultural (drama and the world) themes. The story includes a heroine, a declaration of love, a breach of promise, a quest, devotion and sacrifice, and the gaining of agency needed to combat a trollish curse. At the end, we will discuss how the tale may speak to contemporary living.

WORKSHOP C. FLÁVIA JANIASKI VALE & TEAM: DRAMA, BIOMES AND BRAZILIAN CULTURES - AN EXPERIENTIAL APPROACH

In this workshop, participants will be invited to engage in an immersive experience of Process Drama, exploring conventions and ways of working that have been developed and reinterpreted within the Brazilian context. The experience will draw on the project "Drama as a Teaching Method: Artistic-Educational Technologies in the Context of Threatened Brazilian Biomes and Cultures," developed in Brazil. Through the body, imagination, fiction and engagement with place, we will create a space for experimentation and dialogue between drama practices in Brazil and the participants' own experiences. ABOUT THE VENUE

St John's Campus, University of Worcester, Henwick Grove, Worcester WR2 6AJ

BY TRAIN

There are two train stations in Worcester: Worcester Foregate Street and Worcester Shrub Hill. There is also another station, Worcestershire Parkway, a short taxi ride away. Trains run from Birmingham and from London; there is a taxi rank outside Worcester Foregate Station. Approximate travel times:

- Birmingham New Street - 50 minutes
- London Paddington - 2 hours 20 minutes
- Manchester Piccadilly - 2 hours 30 minutes

BY CAR

Worcester is served by the M5 motorway and is accessible from Junctions 6 and 7. Under normal traffic conditions all university campuses can be reached in 15-20 minutes from Junction 7.

BY BUS

First Bus services 31, 31A, and U1 connect the St John's Campus to the City Centre Bus Station. You can also walk from the city centre to the campus (15 minutes approximately).

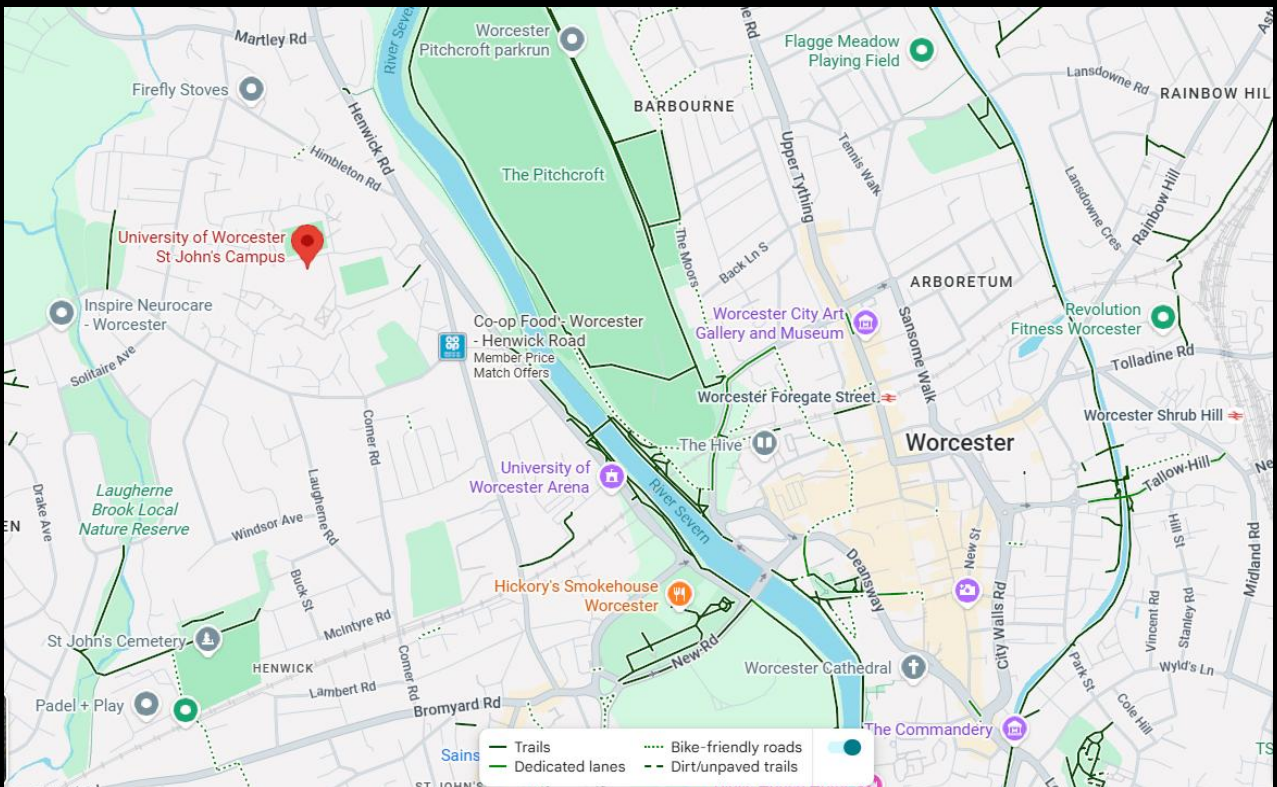
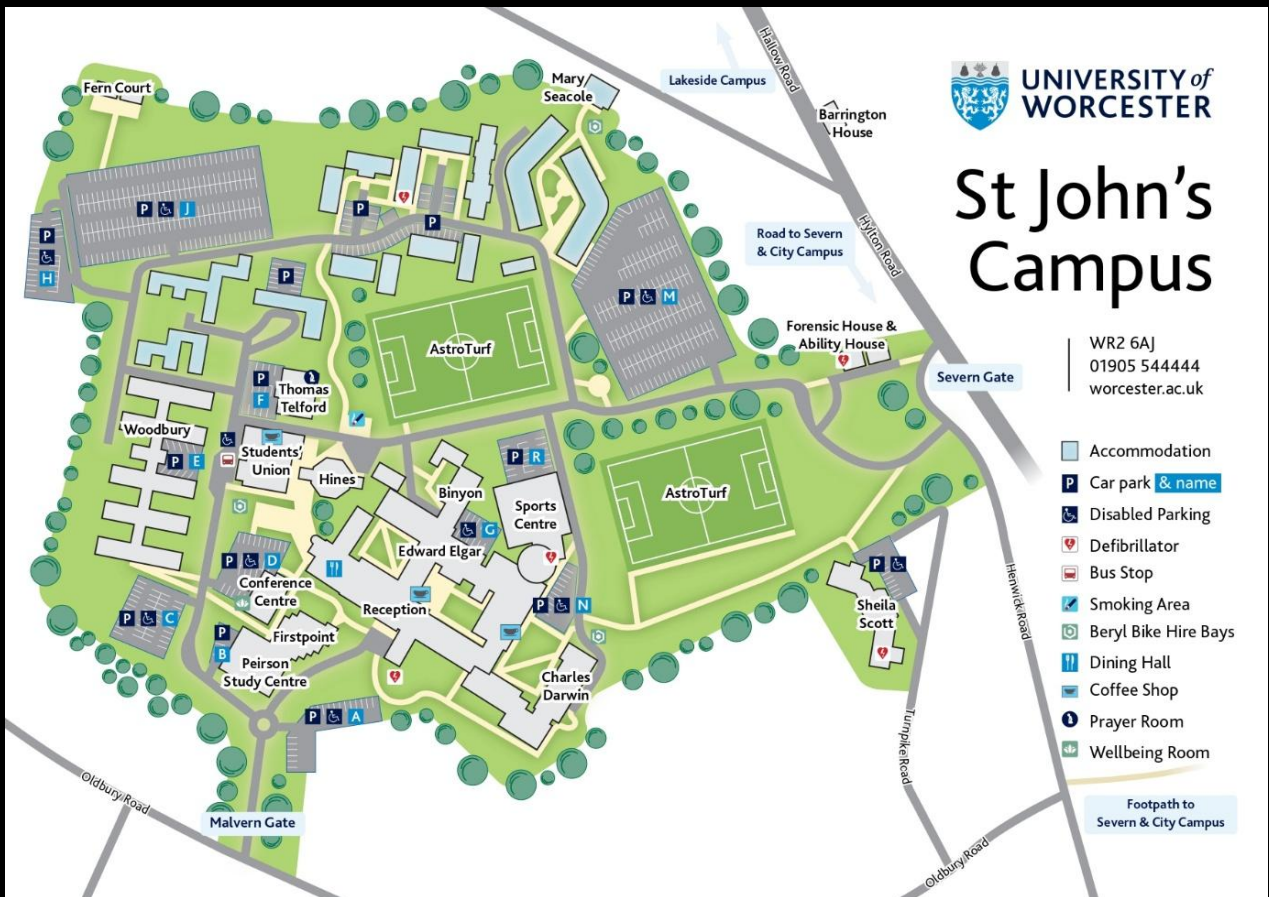

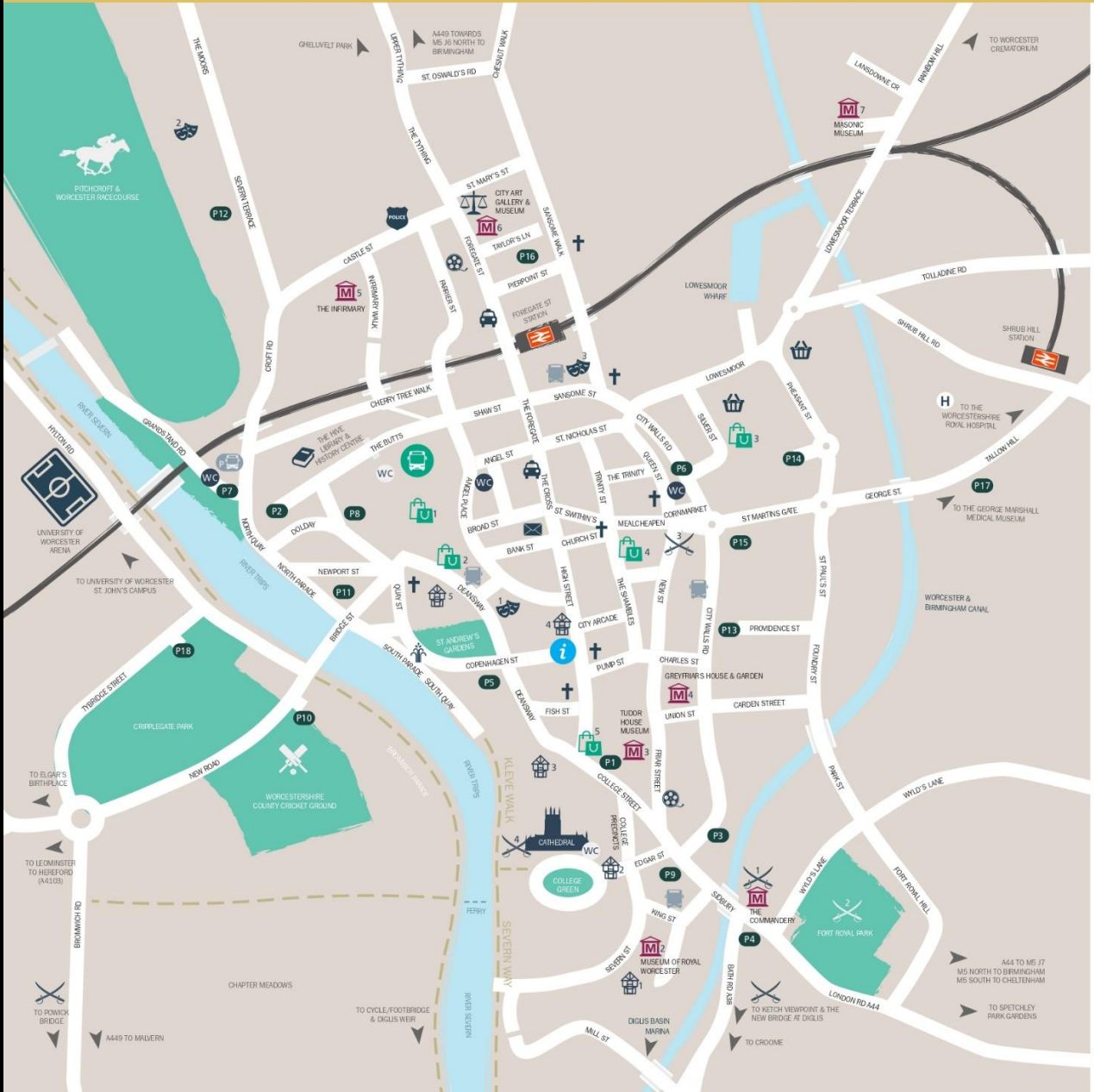
